## The Revised Fundamental Law of Education (2006)

'Life-long learning,' Social Education

## Life-long Learning Promotion Act (1990)

-Promotion of infrastructure development of Life-long learning by nation (Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology-Japan), prefectures, and education boards in prefectures

### Background

- (1) the need to remedy Japanese society's preoccupation with academic credentials;
- (2) increased demand for learning activities in a developing society;
- (3) the need for learning in response to social and economic change;
- (4) the need to revive and improve the educational strengths of the home and the local community.






